- Initial intense bone pain, sudden onset; at first continuous, later intermittent.
- Fever, thirst, loss of appetite, sleeplessness, dark-coloured urine with sediment.
- Swelling develops on one end of diaphysis; sharp margins; painful to slightest touch.
- Swelling initially soft, later becomes hard; hypersensitivity to touch.
- Abscess formation, suppuration, septic complications.
- Benign tumours and circumscribed hard spots.
